

**PERMIT APPLICATION INFORMATION FOR COMMERCIAL RECREATION
(NON-HUNTING) OPERATIONS
Arctic National Wildlife Refuge**

Early permit application (February-April) is encouraged to facilitate timely processing and ensure that you will meet your business schedule. Permit issuance slows after late April due to other work demands and priorities. Please be aware that permits can take up to 45 days to process, especially if we must request additional information due to incomplete applications.

The following items are required to obtain a permit. Most, but not all are specifically requested in the enclosed Special Use Permit Application form:

- 1. A list of the trips you wish to take, including the area(s) you wish to backpack in, the rivers you wish to float, base camp sites (if any), and the time period(s) you want to use the Refuge. (Permits are issued only for the period needed, not to extend beyond the end of the calendar year.)**
- 2. A check or money order for \$100 (a non-refundable administrative fee), payable to the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service. Additional permit fees, based on actual client use, will be collected later (see accompanying Permit Fee Policy).**
- 3. A copy of your Alaska business license (or accepted, paid application).**
- 4. Evidence of adequate liability insurance (see accompanying Liability Insurance Requirements).**
- 5. The names of all guides and assistants (cooks, helpers, air charter services, etc.) who will be operating on the Refuge in connection with your operation. (Note: all employees must be listed before entering the Refuge, but all names are not required for permit issuance).**
- 6. The maximum number of clients planned per trip.**
- 7. The full name and title of the person legally responsible for the company's activities (normally the owner or president). Permits will be issued only to that person, followed by the company name. (Note: only that person is allowed to sign the permit).**
- 8. Your Tax Identification Number (TIN), or your social security number.**

Permits cannot be issued until all the required items are received. However, do not delay your application if you are not completely sure of some trips or have not hired all of your personnel. Changes to personnel, activities, locations, and dates can easily be made by amendment, which usually requires a telephone call (907/456-0250 or 800/362-4546) and follow-up verification by FAX (907/456-0428) (preferred method) or letter.

Please be aware that commercial recreation (non-hunting) operations within the Arctic Refuge do not guarantee, nor explicitly or implicitly imply, levels of use or privileges to operate in the future.

LIABILITY INSURANCE REQUIREMENTS FOR COMMERCIAL OPERATORS
Arctic National Wildlife Refuge

Insurance is required for all commercial operators who provide services to the public on Refuge lands. All policies must: 1) cover every aspect of the services provided to clients, and 2) contain a notification clause stating that the Refuge will be given 30 days notice before coverage is canceled (documentation provided to the Refuge must verify this clause).

Proof of insurance provided to the Refuge can be either a Certificate of Insurance or letter issued by the insurance company. The documentation must name the insured and the insurer, indicate the extent and kind of coverage (for example, “recreational guiding, including river floating”), and list the United States Fish & Wildlife Service as an “additional insured” unless accompanied by a waiver of subrogation naming the United States Fish & Wildlife Service.

The following outlines the minimum liability insurance requirements for commercial operators. The requirements apply statewide on all Fish and Wildlife Service administered lands.

TRANSPORTER (BOAT) (without on-the-ground services) Boat over 24', tidal waters Boat under 24', inland waters	Marine Liability: \$300,000 Comprehensive or Guide/Outfitter Liability: \$300,000/occurrence, \$500,000/year aggregate

**PERMIT FEE POLICY FOR
COMMERCIAL RECREATION AND TRANSPORTING
Arctic National Wildlife Refuge**

The Fish and Wildlife Service (Service) published a notice in the Federal Register on May 31, 1991, which proposed revising permit fees to charge three percent of the estimated gross income for commercial operations on national wildlife refuges. During the public review period, the guiding industry told the Service that they strongly favored a client-use-day fee system. After reviewing their proposal, the Service agreed to develop and adopt a client-use-day system, believing it was an easier, more efficient way of generating and computing revenue.

The new system went into effect in 1993 at one-half the set rates, to allow operators a one year adjustment period. The full rates (see below) were implemented in 1994. The use day fees are adjusted to the economy every three years, using the Implicit Price Deflator Index (compiled and published yearly by the U.S. Department of Commerce) as the adjustment base. The present adjusted rates (see below) were put into effect in 1997.

Commercial guide and transporter fees are computed by multiplying the actual client use days by the activity rate. A client use day is defined as one calendar day (24 hours), or any portion thereof, for each client using the Refuge. Client use day rates vary for different activities (see below). However, if a client engages in activities that have different use day fees, the rate for the entire trip will be based on the activity with the highest daily fee. For example, a combination fishing and caribou hunting trip will be charged entirely at the caribou hunting rate.

Permits will be issued only after payment of a non-refundable \$100 administrative fee. A Tax Identification Number (TIN) or Social Security number is also required for permit processing. All permits require the permittee to keep accurate records and report client use days to the Refuge (listing arrival/departure dates and the number of clients in each group or activity) on or before the due date stated in the permit. Actual use fees will be computed from the report and billed to the permittee. Bills must be paid within 30 days after receipt to avoid suspension of permit privileges.

Fees for guiding/outfitting and transporting on national wildlife refuges in Alaska are as follows:

Brown Bear Hunting	\$16.70/client use day (minimum \$100/client) on Alaska Peninsula, Becharof, Izembek, and Kodiak refuges
Brown/Grizzly Bear Hunting	\$11.15/client use day on all other refuges
Moose and Dall Sheep Hunting	\$11.15/client use day
Hunting for All Other Species	\$5.60/client use day
Sport Fishing	\$2.25/client use day
River floating	\$2.25/client use day
Backpacking, Photography, Birding, Other	\$2.25/client use day
TRANSPORTING	\$2.25/client use day (includes only days when operator is on Refuge lands - for drop off, shuttle, and pick-up)
(includes air taxi operations)
